COMMUNITY VISIONING SESSION REPORT



Summary of Brainstormed Discussions from March 22-23, 2019 Community Visioning Sessions

"I was in second grade when integration began and I thought it was great that we were all in class together. That's how it should be and all was right with the world. I was always proud of my town and in my naiveté it seemed to me we were mostly removed from the racism that plagued the rest of the world in the news.

Last fall, I stood in the confines of the Calfee School building and listened as Dr. Marylen Harmon told the story of how her father took on the Pulaski County School Board for equal pay and treatment no matter your color. And how it was a landmark case that helped lead directly to *Brown v. Board of Education (1954)*. And how a young Thurgood Marshall helped handle the case...and I cried. I cried for their bravery but more so I cried for my ignorance. How could I live here for almost 60 years and not know that these things happened right here in our town? How did I not learn this in school?

That day still overwhelms me. That was the day I realized that ignorance is created and "fake news" is not a new thing. The history that I and every child in Pulaski County have been taught up until now is incomplete. Your history is Pulaski's history and we must make sure that going forward our children learn all of it. Knowing where we have been shows us the path forward and opens the door for us to show respect and kindness to one another. Thank you all for being a part of Pulaski's path forward."

METHODOLOGY

In early 2018, a group of Calfee Training School former students and their families, the Town of Pulaski, the Pulaski County YMCA, the Pulaski County Department of Social Services and local parents of young children began working to acquire and renovate the historic African American school. The original goals of the Calfee Training School Project were to (1) meet some of the deep childcare needs in Pulaski County and (2) to preserve and tell the rich history of this institution and the local African American community through a museum. Those goals will be met in what is being called "Phase 1" and includes the front part of the Calfee Training School building.

But "Phase 2" - the rest of the building - is not yet designed. On March 22 and 23, 2019, the Calfee Training School Project convened Community Visioning Sessions with goals to educate the community about the history of the historic African American school and to generate ideas for how the building could be used in the future as a community and cultural center. Over 150 people attended these four-hour sessions to hear stories about the history of the school from former students and to brainstorm future uses that were consistent with the building's legacy. Those who were unable to attend were invited to submit their ideas about the future building uses via an online survey.

This survey includes the ideas about future uses that were voiced most often in this visioning process. Please take a moment to provide feedback on these ideas. The future Calfee Training School Community and Cultural Center Board will be presented with this community feedback as they develop the plans for renovation and future uses of the building.

LEGACIES

At the community visioning sessions, the alumni of Calfee Training School shared memories and stories at their tables. At most tables, stories were shared about the infamous Ms. Anderson and Ms. Lena Huckstep's delicious brown beans and cornbread. From the unforgettable May Day celebration to playing murderball and football with a gravel filled milk carton, Calfee had it all. Even though Calfee was named a "training school" because white people in the Jim Crow South didn't believe Black children could or should learn more than whatever they needed to prepare for domestic or agricultural work, Calfee teachers ensured that their students always received the best education. The teachers were strict but still loved their students dearly. Commanding respect, and through leadership and compassion, the teachers of Calfee Training School dedicated their lives to their students and community, offering a valuable educational curriculum that prepared Calfee students for life and not just to be workers.

The dominant themes generated in these discussions included:

- Teachers and staff were highly qualified and committed to delivering a holistic education for all students that included extremely high expectations for all.
- Students were prepared for the future, not only in terms of work preparedness, but also in terms of being citizens, in spite of the "training school" philosophy that only endeavored to prepare Black children for domestic or agricultural jobs.
- The Calfee Training School was like a family that included faculty, staff, and students as well as parents and other
 community members. Most of the African American community felt at home there and were collectively committed to
 the success of all students.
- Extremely limited school financial resources inspired a sense of creativity and innovation that was evident in everything
 from the curriculum, to the food prepared for the students, to the games the students created for themselves during
 recess.

IDEAS FOR COMMUNITY AND CULTURAL CENTER USES

In addition to a childcare center and a museum space for local African American history, the community visioning session participants generated long lists of ideas for repurposing of the Calfee Training School building. The following ideas were shared more than once during the small group report-outs.

Spaces

- Multipurpose Space equipped with everything necessary for hosting performing arts events (music, dance, theatre) as well as interactive community meetings. The space could be available for rental for reunions, weddings and other events. (Revenue Generating)
- Commercial Kitchen (with walk in freezer/fridge units for food distribution program)
- One-stop Shop for Human Services space for food distribution, social services, tutoring, etc.)
- Non-Profit/Human Services/Small Business Workspace for Rent (Revenue Generating)
- Playground
- Senior Center (Adult Day Care) creates opportunities for intergenerational work with childcare center
- Computer lab for tutoring or classes
- Gymnasium
- Coffeeshop/Cafe (could be revenue generating)
- Community Gardens

Programs:

- Adult Education Programs including, but not limited to classes related to GED, health/wellness, dance, theatre, music, technology
- Youth Programs including, but not limited to youth leadership, mentoring, after school programs, arts, theatre, music, life skills, tutoring and parks/recreation.
- **Community Meetings** Regularly scheduled events to bring the community together. Some ideas for meetings include addiction issues, Black history, sexual assault, police/community relations, and self defense.
- Mental Health Services/Counseling
- May Day Event

How to Connect Calfee Community and Cultural Center with the community:

- **Historical Tourism** A walking tour that connects the school with the Moone Hotel, the Ratcliffe Museum, downtown, and the TG Howard Center. Also marketing plans that collectively advertise Calfee, the Ratcliffe Museum, the Wilderness Museum and Christiansburg Institute.
- Small museum and other educational outreach at Pulaski County High School
